

July Guest Speaker is Sonoma County's own Iim Markel

Jim Markel is President of Apex Aviation Corporation. Apex is one of the Fixed Base Operators at the Charles M. Schulz - Sonoma County Airport providing fueling, aircraft maintenance and management, on-demand charter, hangar, and aircraft sales services. In addition to Sonoma County, Apex has operations in Concord and Napa.

Jim has been involved in the aviation industry, with a focus on the business airplane sector, for thirty years. He believes in being an active contributor and putting something back into both the local and worldwide communities his company serves. Jim recently completed a two year stint on the International Aircraft Appraisers Board of Governors and is currently the Chairman of the National Aircraft Resale Association; a Washington, DC based trade group that establishes ethical standards and best practices procedures for aircraft sales and leasing transactions. Here in Sonoma County, he sits on the Airline Attraction Advisory Committee and is a supporter, both personally and through his Company, of the Pacific Coast Air Museum.

Jim is an experienced pilot and maintains his flying currency regularly occupying the cockpit of corporate jets during business travel. He holds an Airline Transport Pilot certificate with Type Ratings in Learjet's, Citations, Falcons, Sabreliners, Challengers, Gulfstreams, and the Boeing 747.

Jim began his association with airplanes as a fighter pilot in the United States Marine Corps flying supersonic jets. During his seven years on active duty, he flew over 100 combat missions and was awarded five Air Medals and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

I asked Billy what his favorite part of this volunteering is and he replied that one of his favorites is talking to the kids during the Open Cockpit weekends. He says that the most frequent question he is asked is ,"where are the guns"? There is always something to learn when talking to our Members of the Month.

I was surprised to learn that Billy works for Lee Histology Lab at nights and thus he is unable to attend the member meetings. When Billy goes to work, he handles over 200 different biopsies at times. He actually cuts the tissue into ribbons thinner than a hair, puts the samples on a slide and uses a stain so that the doctors can look at the cellular structure. MMMMM; that alone makes Billy a very interesting guy. Pacific Coast Air Museum Participates in Beale AFB Air Show

On the weekend of June 3 & 4th, a team of thirteen Pacific Coast Air Museum (PCAM) members did us proud at the Beale Air Force Base Air Show. Our team, led by Norma Nation, Duane Coppock and Linda Wright, transported and set up our PCAM booth where we sold museum Gift Shop items and handed out "Wings Over Wine Country" Air Show information.

The PCAM Flight Foundation flew their C-45 to Beale where it was on display for the very first time ever. It was extremely popular. Guy Smith and Don Doherty, who staffed the C-45, commented that the big rotary engines were the most photographed engines at the entire show. Despite the fact that we were not in a good location on Saturday, we moved Saturday evening, set up a second location by the C-45 and had an excellent day Sunday promoting our museum and Air Show, and selling gift shop items. Thanks to a lot of hard work we sold almost \$3,000 worth of items and netted a nice profit after expenses and cost of goods were figured; AND we got to see an awesome two day Air Show. The USAF Thunderbirds (and their first ever female demonstration pilot—she done good!!!), the U.S. Army Golden Knights, U2s, T-38s, F-15, F-18, Eddie Andreini in his Stearman, Rich Perkins and his L-39 Tigercat, Dan Buchanan in his hang glider and a number of other great acts. One of the highlights was the Air Force's newest airlifter, the C-17 Globemaster III, which put on an incredible aerial demonstration in which it took off in 1,000 feet, never left the traffic pattern, landed in 1,700 feet, then backed up half a mile and backed off the runway. The best news is that the C-17 will be at our "Wings Over Wine Country" Air Show this year, as will the U-2 on Saturday and the T-38s on Sunday. Our merry band of 13 socialized together each evening, worked hard during the day, and all in all had a great time. Beale AFB personnel were wonderful to work with and made us all proud of today's U.S. Air Force.

Last, but not least, our Executive Director and his bride got to spend three days on his old base, living in base quarters, trying (and succeeding) in re-living his days of old. He was overheard telling the new Wing Commander that he's a volunteer to re-up and go back to Beale.

Many thanks to all who volunteered and helped and to Norma, Duane and Linda for all their hard work in bringing it off so well.

East Patio- - - A Long Awaited Dream Coming True

The brand new East Patio, formerly known as the Lanai, is under construction and progressing nicely towards completion. Thanks to the generosity of Gloria Going, a friend of Fred Zanotto, our wonderful new addition to the Pacific Coast Air Museum is almost complete. Fred, a local attorney, winemaker and aviator lost his life in an aircraft accident last fall while returning to Santa Rosa from his office in Ukiah. Gloria wanted to donate something to the museum that would honor Fred's love of aviation. The East Patio became the avenue to do just that. Using plans developed by Tom Whitson, museum member and former board member, and under the expert construction management of Jim Long, our President, the project is progressing nicely toward completion. The preparatory earthwork was done by our own Guy Smith. Gravel was delivered and compressed. Jim then framed up the patio floor and before we knew it, concrete was being poured, and the framing for the overhead cover supports were in place almost like magic. On a cold and drizzly Saturday morning, Jim Long supervised the delivery and pouring of the concrete for the flagpole base. He was assisted (and supervised) by the other characters you see in the photographs below. Iim Cook, (renamed by the Executive Director with the call sign "Painter 01") painted the framing. Then Jim Long attached the screening material that forms the roof, and then as if by magic again, the flagpole was erected, again by guess who—-Jim Long. (is he a real magician)? The stone is now cemented around the flagpole base. All that remains is landscaping around the patio and the plaque honoring Fred Zanotto to be manufactured and installed. We will have a grand opening and dedication sometime this fall. Many thanks to Gloria Going for her generous donation that made the East Patio possible, to Jim Long, (resident magician) for his expert construction management and sweat equity, and to Jim Cook and the others who contributed to making this long awaited project come to fruition. This terrific addition to our Pacific Coast Air Museum will provide a wonderful venue for birthday parties and other great events. We'll publicize the date of the grand opening and dedication. Hopefully, many of you will plan to be there.






