

CHARLES M. SCHULZ-SONOMA COUNTY AIRPORT OPEN HOUSE JUNE 16, 2007

Our "Climb Aboard" a Huge Hit.

On Saturday, June 16th, the Charles M. Schulz-Sonoma County Airport presented their second annual open house to introduce the Sonoma County community to their airport. Pacific Coast Air Museum participated by having two aircraft and the Rose Parade float at the site. The gates were opened from 8 AM to 4 PM and approximately 200 people from the community attended. This was "Climb Aboard" weekend at the Museum so the A-6 *Invader* was open and visitors went to both locations.

For the open house, the two aircraft were the A-26 *Invader* and the RF-8 *Crusader* nose section and both were opened for "Climb Aboard". They were the hit of the open house. People saw the two airplanes and they were very interested in inspecting them.

It took a lot of effort by the two crews to have the planes ready by June 16th. Picture this. Both crews had a deadline of August 18th, the Air Show. About two months ago **Jim Cook**, Master Crew Chief, approached both crew chiefs, **Terry Lorence** and **Ron Stout** and asked them if they could have their airplanes ready by June 16th. This was a big deal. Ron's A-26 had the right strut and wheel off so he could complete repairs on the right nacelle because if the repairs were not completed the wheel could collapse as they towed the airplane. Terry's airplane required much work installing instruments in the cockpit, a good clean-up, and applying protective coating. In Navy colors, of course. Both crews spent many extra hours working to get the airplanes ready. And they did it!

During the open house Terry and his crew, **Rachel Lorence** and **Robin Dotti**, had visitors climbing into the cockpit all day. Ron's crew on the A-26 had their visitors climb an air stair to get up to the cockpit. They saw a great interior restoration done by **Rick Elwood**. Ron's crew for the open house was **Rose Pattenaude**, **Ben Martin**, Ben's grandmother, **Marlena Holway**, junior member, **Kyle Johnson** and **Joe Cholewa**. Not only did the two crews help with the open house, they also put in many hours of work preparing the airplanes.

The crew manning the Rose Parade float was **Michael Callen**, **Kathy Kumpula** and **Duane Coppock**. We used **Paul Heck's** Jeep to tow the float and it was used as a photo op by many visitors.

July Guest Speaker: Art Cader

World War II pilot received Distinguished Flying Cross.

5/8/2007-Travis Air Force Base, Calif .-

Art Cader (former Army Air Corps 1st Lt.) received the Distinguished Flying Cross for actions he took almost 63 years ago, during a ceremony at the Travis Air Museum Monday.\

Mr. Cader earned the medal for his heroism during a bombing mission he was part of September 30, 1944, during World War II.

The medal is given to any officer or enlisted person of the armed forces who exhibits heroism or extraordinary achievement while participating in an aerial flight.

While stationed at Komasoren Airdrome, Noemfoor Island in the Pacific, Lieutenant Cader, a B-24 Bomber pilot, and his crew set out on a mission to bomb the Japanese oil refineries at Balikpapan, Borneo. This particular mission was an especially dangerous one because it was longer than usual missions; they carried only 40 per cent of the normal ammunition to conserve fuel and the aircraft was three tons over it's weight limit because of bombs and fuel, explained Mr. Cader. Shortly before they reached the target area, they were attacked by Japanese enemy fighters. As they began their attack on the B-24s, some of the crew from other aircraft began to bail out. Lt. Cader noticed this and to protect his fellow crewmembers, took his aircraft out of formation and descended with a damaged plane to give covering fire for the parachuting crews. Despite engine damage and loss of fuel, he brought his aircraft and crew safely back to base and later volunteered for a subsequent bombing mission on Borneo.

"Mr. Cader distinguished himself with courage and flight skill", said Master Sergeant Nancy Crowell, 6th Air Refueling Squadron First Sergeant. "Today, more than 60 years after those events, we have the tremendous opportunity to finally and properly honor his service.".

"During every one of his 44 missions, Mr. Cader never lost a plane or a crewmember", said Col. Steve Arquiette, 60th Air Mobility Wing Commander. "It is because of his discipline, loyalty and patriotism that we honor him today".
