### 13th Season for Hot Dog Thursday!

Some people say 13 is an unlucky number. Some hotels and elevators don't even have a 13<sup>th</sup> floor. For PCAM, 13 is a lucky number.

When we started Hot Dog Thursday we thought if we made it through two seasons we'd be lucky, much less 13! April 5, 2018 began our 13<sup>th</sup> year and all who attended celebrated with cake and champagne and a presentation by our President, Dave Ford.

This event has been a tremendous success for the Pacific Coast Air Museum. It has been a total team effort by the whole Hot Dog Thursday crew and the gift shop crew working together to make our Museum standout. Over the years the Hot Dog Thursday event has contributed \$130,000 in profits to the Museum. In addition, the gift shop sales have added substantially to that number.

Hot Dog Thursday has been the de facto once a month social event around the airport from early spring to early fall.



We started this event with a group of guys (Ed Nelson, Barney Hagan, Duane Coppock, and Bill Green) called the Tuesday/Thursday I explained group. the idea to them and since we were here anyway, maybe we could sell some hotdogs. After much deliberation board approval the decision was made to plan the first Hot Dog Thursday. With

a bit more brain-storming, the guys came up with some ideas and the event got rolling.

It started slow, as you might expect. That was a blessing because it gave us time to adjust what we needed

to do to make the event a success. We started advertising in the Straight Scoop and marketing to the business parks around the airport. The first year we sold around 100 hotdogs on the first Thursday of the month, April through October. The second year we were selling over 200 hotdogs; the third year we were selling over 300 hotdogs and heading for 400!

It was beginning to look like we would need more seating. Our patio just couldn't accommodate the crowd. We came up with the idea of using pop-up tents and tables in front of the airplanes. Very soon we were starting to look like the mash unit on TV!



As time went on, we received requests from Sonoma Jet Center to cook hotdogs at their open house event. We were happy to accommodate their request which allowed us to increase the funds we donated to the Museum. Eventually we started selling hot dogs during some of PCAM's other events like the Wheels and Wings Car Show and the Celebrating the Living Historians of World War II & Korea Veterans event.

We are very grateful for the businesses who have supported Hot Dog Thursday through the years with their generous sponsorship, which has allowed us to keep the price of the hot dog lunch at \$5.00 and still reach our goal of contributing support to the Museum. All in all we expect the 13<sup>th</sup> season to be a good one for the Pacific Coast Air Museum.

The four hour event was attended by several hundred students and their families. Students were given the opportunity to fly a desktop simulator of a Cessna 172, taking off on Runway 14 at the Charles M. Schultz – Sonoma County Airport (STS), turning downwind and performing an approach and landing at their "home" field.

PCAM President, Dave Ford and Education Committee Head Charley Taylor packed the equipment. PCAM's Aviation Explorer Post 707 member Amy Melman volunteered to act as Simulator Instructor having gained her experience operating her own software at home. Amy did a superb job working with the young audience.





As the phoshow, tos there was a continual line as young pilots lined for up chance to fly around the pattern. software glitch occasionally shut down the plane's engine allowing some pilots to simulate an engine failure in flight and the subsequent

emergency landing somewhere near the airport. Flying around their own STS airport also provided some unexpected experiences. One young aviator heard his mother exclaim, "You just flew over Grandpa's house!"

The Science Fair organizer was able to fly the simulator and sent the following much appreciated letter:

# Army Pilot Training and Missions Its not if, its when

May 16, 2018 Guest Speaker Robert Nance, US Army, CWO4 (Ret.)

Robert Nance joins us Wednesday night, May 16<sup>th</sup>, to share his stories about flying the uh-1 Huey Helicopter during the Vietnam War. His talk will include details on flight school and training during the mid 1960s. He will focus on his Vietnam combat tour flying with the 162<sup>nd</sup> Assault Helicopter Company from 15 January 1968 through 15 January 1969.

Bob's will also discuss his Army flying career to include flight instructor duties teaching future Vietnam bound pilots. After joining the California Army National Guard his flying included the UH-60G Blackhawk on a combat tour as medical evacuation pilot in Bosnia and search and rescue missions over the Sierras.



### **Biography**

Robert Nance was raised and schooled in Napa, graduating High School in 1963. He joined the US Army while attending Junior College in December 1967. He received his Army wings in December 1968. After completing his one year combat tour in Vietnam, Bob served a flight instructor at Hunter Army Airfield in Savannah, Georgia.

Bob returned to Napa to join the Napa Fire Department in 1971 and in 1975 joined the National Guard

and returned to combat flying combat "medevac" missions in Bosnia in 1998-1999. Having survived a 2001 crash at Mt. Shasta flying search and rescue, Bob left active duty that year as well as retiring from the Napa Fire Department. He has accumulated approximately 8000 flying hours and earned as he puts it, "A bunch of attaboys and awe shucks (sic)" over his six decades of flying.

# April Guest Speaker – Alan Chesterman Operation Nickel Grass

If you were unable to attend our April Member's Meeting, you missed an informative and upbeat presentation by Alan Chesterman, Commander, USNR (Ret.). In 1973, Al was a Navy Lieutenant Instructor Pilot and Landing Signal Officer (LSO) in the A-4 Skyhawk Replacement Squadron (VA-127) at



NAS Lemoore CA. Following the October invasion of Israel by Egypt and Syria, the U.S. embarked on a massive airlift to directly fly war supplies as well as dozens of combat aircraft to replace losses sustained during the Yom Kippur War.

Al detailed the demands of flying from Lemoore to Norfolk

VA on to the Azores, then to the flight deck of the USS Roosevelt (CVA-42) in the Mediterranean. The final leg of the 7,500 mile journey included Israeli Air Force F-4 Phantom escorts to Air Force Bases in Israel. Describing the immediate need to get the replacement jets into combat, Al tells of seeing the Star of David being painted over the Stars and Bars as he walked away from his group of Skyhawks.

### **Veterans History Project**

The Pacific Coast Air Museum's Oral History Team is actively interviewing World War II, Korean and Vietnam War veterans for the Library of Congress' Veteran's History Project. Each interview is catalogued and entered into the Library of Congress, the archives of The Pacific Coast Air Museum in Santa Rosa in the process of being constructed, and each interviewee is provided a copy (DVD) for themselves and their family.

The Oral History Project of the Pacific Coast Air Museum is an extension of the national Veteran's History Project. The current PCAM Oral History team is continuing the effort of the prior team and continues the project of collecting oral histories of local veterans. The mission of the Veteran's History Project at the Library of Congress is to collect the memories, accounts and documents of war veterans and to preserve these stories of experience and service for future generations.

Legislation was passed in October, 2000 to create the Veteran's History Project as part of the Library of Congress and its America Folklife Center. The project encompasses veterans of WWI, WWII, Korean, Vietnam, Persian, Iraq and Afghan wars, with Cold War and peacetime contributions also welcomed. By "veterans", it is meant all veterans, men and women, who served in war and in support of combat operations, all ranks in all branches of service – the Army, Air Corp and Air Force, Navy Marine Corps, and Coast Guard. It also includes the Merchant Marines, those involved in home front activities and citizens who supported the armed services.

The team's first priority is to focus on the most senior of the veterans. To date eight veterans on our list have passed away, two before we could capture their stories. We are grateful that we have captured over 70 stories to date. Additionally, their families are grateful that they have this permanent record to

watch and share with others. Some families have played the DVD during memorial services, and later commented that they brought fond memories, laughter, and tears to all.

"We were just doing our job," is the most common phrase we have heard in two years of interviewing local veterans. Most veterans, no matter their branch of service, assignment or outcome of their experience, have let us know this was their focus during that greatest challenge to America's freedom. We've recorded stories from fighter and transport pilots, paratroopers, sailors, infantrymen, gunners, navigators, a military journalist, Red Cross worker, radio operator and combat engineers, and a Merchant Marine.

Our presentation June 20th will highlight some snippets of interviews we've done, touching on just a few themes – early interest in aviation, boot camp, learning to fly, being shot down, witnessing the desperate escapes from the fall of Saigon, to the touching moments of returning home to loved ones. These veterans were eyewitnesses to history and we feel privileged and awed to hear and record their stories.

Our team is comprised of Carol Lawson who serves as coordinator, John Nelson, - videographer, Nancy Sandborn - note taker and Marilyn Pahr - interviewer.

#### **Crew News**

### A-26 Invader Update

Recently the A-26 crew completed the installation of the 2 underwing machine pods with .50 caliber machine guns. The pods were acquired by former A-26 Crew Chief and PCAM Master Crew Chief Ron Stout. After years of searching, he located them in Marseille, France, and generously donated them to PCAM.

Finding the mounting mechanisms and machine guns was equally difficult, so senior crew member Rick Elwood utilized his incredible machinist skills to make the mounting units and the 4 guns. Using actual .50 caliber machine guns as models, Rick fabricated the parts from light weight materials, making the guns about 1/20th the weight of the originals. This lighter product made the mounting process much easier. The final product possessed the same exact details and dimensions of the original guns, making them difficult to identify as copies.

Michael Elliott-Jones and Greg Ervice assisted in portions of the fabrication process, and in the final mounting.



Completion of this project puts the long term restoration process of the A-26 one step closer to completion. As one of the 2 original aircraft acquired by PCAM, the "City of Santa Rosa" arrived at the museum in hundreds of parts, and missing many more. Many dozens of volunteers have helped over the years with the restoration process making it one of the most inclusive PCAM projects.

# Blue Angels F-4N Phantom II Cockpit Simulator—May 19 & May 20

Our Blue Angels F-4N Phantom II is a cockpit simulator used to train Phantom pilots. Even though it looks like a real F-4N, it is not.

The military brought the Blue Angels Simulator to our 1998 air show for the first time, and it was a big hit. After that show the Sim was put into storage and forgotten until 2006 when it was offered to the Pacific Coast Air Museum.

Since then our F-4N Simulator has had a successful career educating and inspiring our youth, supporting the military, and promoting aviation at events around the west coast.



F-4C Phantom II—May 19 & May 20

The workhorse of Vietnam was the F-4 Phantom II. It was used in a number of combat roles.

Pacific Coast Air Museum's F-4 was an Air Force jet. After its service life was over, the jet was assigned to the Sierra Army Depot, on Highway 395, north of Reno, where it sat for several years with it's twin F-4, out in the middle of nowhere on the base.

As fate would have it, two museums got word of the aircraft and applied for acquisition. Pacific Coast Air Museum was one of the museums selected to receive one of the aircraft. In 1994, crews of Pacific Coast Air Museum members spent many hours on

the Army base, in desolate conditions, taking the F-4 apart. It was very hard as the aircraft was built to take a lot of abuse, and was not easy to dismantle.

Slowly, pieces began to arrive, and other crews, as well as the disassembly crews, put it back together, for a permanent home at Sonoma county.



# F-106 Delta Dart—May 19 & May 20

In the early 1950's it became clear that the Interceptor being developed by Convair would not be operational by its 1954 deadline. Faced with this problem, the US Air Force decided to procure from Convair a less sophisticated interim interceptor. This emerged as the F-102A Delta Dagger and the original project was then designated the F-102B. It is this latter project which eventually became the F-106 Delta Dart.

On June 17th 1956, the F-102B was officially designated the F-106, reflecting the fact that the original requirements had changed considerably.

#### F-106 Delta Dart

All the requirements for speed, altitude and all-weather capability had been increased.

The F-106 Delta Dart was the fastest single-engined jet ever. It was a Cold War interceptor, designed to defend the U.S. homeland from enemy bombers by climbing extremely high and extremely fast and knocking them down with nuclear air-to-air missiles.

The aircraft was the primary air defense weapon for most of the 60's and was kept in service much longer than the original design called for. After more than 20 years service with the USAF, the F-106s were finally withdrawn from service in 1988.



# T-38 Talon—May 19 & May 20

Northrop Aviation began a private venture development program in the mid 1950s to create a high performance lightweight fighter that would be suitable for supply to and operation by friendly nations via the Military Assistance Program. It was designated Northrop N-156 and developed into the YT-38. First flown in 1959, the results were good and the military ordered T-38A Talons which entered

The T-38 is many Air Force pilots' favorite aircraft. Supersonic, maneuverable, easy and fun to fly, it has been highly successful at preparing pilots for flying the world's most advanced tactical jets.

Produced between 1961 and 1972, total aircraft 1187 built for the USAF.
