"Battle History of the U.S.Air Force: Struggling into the Air" (Program for June 21st Member Meeting)

The History Channel and the Air Force Association have put together an outstanding video program detailing the "Battle History of the U.S. Air Force. Our program outlines the birth of military airpower with some outstanding video and narration.

Not long after the Wright Brothers made their historic flight, the U. S. military was investigating the possibility of using these new air machines —with the Wrights providing both the planes and the training. While today's supersonic fighters, stealth bombers and massive transports are a far cry from the kite-like creations that launched the aviation age, they are a part of the same story.

This program is filled with extraordinary footage from the cockpit and from the ground of encounters throughout the 20th Century. The "Battle History of the U. S. Air Force: Struggling into the Air" is a panoramic look at airborne combat from the dawn of military aviation and the birth of the U. S. Army Air Corps.

Our June 21st program features interviews with pilots, engineers and military scholars and includes footage from World Wars I and II and is a definitive history of U. S. Air Force combat from the Wright Brothers through WWII.

BEALE AIR FORCE BASE TOUR

On Friday, April 28th, 50 members of the Pacific Coast Air Museum boarded an Airport Express charter bus, departed the museum at "oh dark thirty", and went to Beale Air Force Base for the day.

The tour was a most interesting and fascinating day for everyone. It started at the Main Gate, while Security personnel checked our identification and a U-2 aircraft took off literally right in front of us. Did someone set this up just for us?

The first stop was to tour the immaculately maintained KC-135 of the Air Force Reserve unit at Beale. With it's new turbo-fan engines, this 40 year old aircraft looked like it had just come off the assembly line. A former Air Force fighter pilot took some of the group underneath the KC-135 and showed them the air refueling positioning lights, boom and how the receiver pilot maneuvers into position for air refueling. While we were on the ramp looking at the KC-135, two U-2 aircraft were shooting "touch and go" landings right in front of our eyes.

Then it was down to the headquarters of the 9th Reconnaissance Wing where Brigadier General Larry Wells gave a fascinating Wing Mission Briefing to our group. He and his wife Kathy were gracious hosts and we're sorry to see them head off to a new assignment at Langley Air Force Base in mid May. But we learned some amazing facts about the mission of the Beale Wing and it's important role in the anti-terrorism efforts of our nation.

Then it was off to lunch at the "chow hall", except now they call it the "dining facility". It's easy to see why, as it is a beautiful facility that serves delicious food.

Then it was back to the flight line for one of the highlights of the day—time to see, touch and feel a real SR-71 aircraft. The sounds of cameras clicking could be heard hundreds of times as everyone marveled at this tremendous aeronautical achievement which still holds the world speed and altitude records for air breathing aircraft.

Next, we were off to the Physiological Support Division. That's the place where they fit, store and maintain all the pressure suits worn by the U-2 pilots (and SR-71 pilots in the past). We got to see how the suits are fitted to the new pilots. Some of us got to see a pilot actually "suit up" and pressure breath before a high flight in a U-2. Dave Pinsky had a chance to reunite with Tom Bowen, "Mr. Pressure Suit", a civilian employee who was there when Dave Served at Beale.

The 99th Reconnaissance Squadron was our next stop. We got a very interesting briefing on flying the U-2, how the pilots are selected for the program, and what the life of a U-2 pilot is like. Then, into the famous "Heritage Room" (bar!) where we were treated to beer, soft drinks, peanuts and popcorn, and an amazing array of U-2 memorabilia. We even saw the name of someone we know on the U-2 "solo board". Could it have been that long ago?

The final stop of the day was a visit to static displays of the U-2, Global Hawk unmanned aerial vehicle and the T-38; all up close and personal. The young Global Hawk maintenance personnel, so proud of their new technology, briefed us in detail on the capability of this amazing new system. The shiny black Beale T-38 had a paint job that even Hawley's Paint was proud of.

On the ride home, a lot of reminiscing could be heard among the former military and airline pilots, and one of our group was heard to say that it felt like just yesterday that he was at Beale and that he would go back there again in a heartbeat.

All in all, from the feedback, it was a wonderful day and a most interesting experience for everyone.





"Horizon Air Coming to Our Airport

As many of you know, commercial air service is coming to our Charles M. Schulz—Sonoma County Airport. Horizon Air will commence flights to Los Angeles and Seattle in March of next year. It is hoped that now that Horizon is coming, other airlines will follow suit and offer flights to even more destinations (I want one to Salt Lake City for skiing!!). The airport and Sonoma County are actively seeking approval and funding to extend Runway 14/32 to 6,000 feet, which would allow regional jets to land at STS. Next time you see Airport Manager Jon Stout, or one of our current County Supervisors, you might say thanks for all they have done to make these things possible. More people coming to our airport means more visitors to the Pacific Coast Air Museum.

It's all the shrimp you can eat, pasta, salad, bread and wine. We'll have some cool raffle prizes, aviation displays and a great time. Tickets must be purchased in advance at the Gift Shop, from any Board member, from me or from Linda Wright. Our "Wings Over Wine Country" Air Show planning is in the serious stages. You won't want to miss this year's Air Show - - a U-2 from Beale will make one or more low passes on Saturday; Beale T-38s will do the same on Sunday. The Air Force's newest airlifter, the C-17, will perform an amazing aerial demonstration of its capabilities on both days. We'll also have a Stearman and a wing walker. The Navy's F-18 will perform, as will the Air Force's A-10 Warthog and T-6 Texans, and we're planning more exciting civilian performers, lots of war birds, plus a tribute to Art Vance. The dates are August 19 & 20 and as always, we can use lots of volunteers.

Our Aviation Education Program for Schoolchildren



The Pacific Coast Air Museum Educational Tours have actually been quite busy this year, in spite of the long, wet spring. As of mid-May, 13 schools have participated in the Tour program. These 13 schools represent 419 children and about 47 educators and parents. To play "catch-up", once the weather improved, we actually did several double headers, two groups a day.

A good example of this was May 16th. We had 51 students and 31 teachers tour at 10:00 and over 90 high school students and 3 teachers at 11:30, for a total that day of 148 people through the museum.

Projecting this further; by June 10th, some 740 students and 96 educators will have heard about the principles of flight, common misconceptions of aviation, aircraft safety, toured out HUEY, Albatross and T-37.

Another 131 youngsters and 64 parents have celebrated with our birthday program, contributing about \$431.00 to the museum fund. In addition, two adult groups totaling 67 have paid \$320.00 for their Saturday tours.

It should be noted that the people who make these numbers work are the docents. They have conservatively put in over 114 man-hours of volunteer time with these tours in the past several months.

This has been a busy time, but a good one, as we further one of our important missions—"to provide an educational venue for the community".

Thanks to Al Morgan, who heads up this important program, and to all the volunteers who help make it so successful.

Pacific Coast Air Museum Volunteers do it everyday, with pride!



Once again I sat in awe listening to our next member of the month. When the hat was passed down from Ron Stout to Mike Fenn, I knew this would be another learning opportunity as I had no recollection of meeting the man known as "the Machinist". I had hopes that this was no ordinary fellow and when our visit was over I knew it to be true.

Mike has been a member of the Pacific Coast Air Museum since 98 and was recruited by Ron Stout when the two found similar interests while taking an aeronautical refresher coarse at the IC, taught by none other than our esteemed Lynn Hunt. Mike has been a machinist for 30 years now and his career has taken an extraordinary path. Mike began his work as a machinist in Micro electronics. Like many of us when I hear that someone is a machinist I think of the types of design work one creates for large motors or applications that are bigger than a 16th of an inch in diameter. With the help of a microscope, Mike was designing and making tools to work with wire the size of 1/1000 inch. These tools are called "wire bonding tools" and are used to bind circuits to the human world as we know it. Mike moved on to a company in which he designed and made both the tools and products for eye glass lens. From this conversation I learned the process of lens making as well as knowledge of the ever changing environment with the tools that make the lenses. In short, a wet goopy plastic, a precise finely curved mold and a special oven creates the prescription glasses you and I wear. Mike shared with me that it was Benjamin Franklin that came up with the lens to lens application which today we wear as one lens and call them bifocals. Mike is a wealth of knowledge and brings to PCAM an expertise that saves our organization an amazing amount of time and money. He is capable of making parts for our old birds in restoration that would essentially cost us bundles if we were to go out to purchase them. It is not uncommon that these parts are not attainable as well.

Mike holds PCAM near and dear to his heart and has great hope for the future of the Air Show and Museum. When I asked what he would like to see in PCAM's future he stated, "A dedicated building, a bigger gift shop and workshop and a opportunity where the public could come and watch the restorations of the old birds." Listening to Mike, his ideas are quite articulate and in depth, much like the kind of guy that he is.

The dedication and sincere desire to see the Pacific Coast Air Museum flourish tends to be a common thread with all those folks I have the good fortune to talk with. I truly believe I speak for the membership when I say thank you Mike for all that you do. You are greatly appreciated.
