

North American RF-86F

In 1953, several F-86F-30s were fitted a suite of photo-reconnaissance cameras at the Tsuiki REMCO facility in Japan, in a project code-named *Haymaker*. All armament, radars, and gun sights were removed, and a camera suite identical to that of the earlier *Ashtray* RF-86As was fitted, but using K-14 cameras in place of the lower-speed K-9s. Again, the K-14s were mounted horizontally, shooting through a mirror complex with an aperture in the bottom of the fuselage. The K-14 "dicing" camera was mounted between the two vertical cameras. As with the RF-86A, the fuselage was bulged to cover the camera suite installation. The modified aircraft were redesignated RF-86F-30.

*Haymaker RF-86F-30s were issued to the 15th TRS at Kimpo in 1953, flying alongside the *Ashtray* aircraft that remained in service. In an attempt to fool enemy MiGs, they had fake gun ports painted on the sides of their noses.

Factory-built RF-86Fs began to be delivered in June of 1953. They were equipped at the factory with two K-22 and one K-17 cameras in an under-fuselage installation. The cameras were mounted vertically, which took the main body of the camera and the film magazines outside the fuselage contours in a bulge on the gun bay doors. 750 pounds of ballast had to be added to the forward fuselage to realign the center of gravity. The cockpit had an elongated canopy to counter a buffet that had appeared caused by the bulged fuselage. The factory aircraft had the new "6-3" wing as standard equipment. A total of 8 were built (serial numbers 52-4337, 4379,4492, 4800, 4808, 4822, 4823, and 4864), but they were too late for combat duty in Korea.

In spite of the success of the RF-86A and F in combat, the USAF opted for the Republic RF-84F Thunderflash as its next-generation tactical reconnaissance aircraft. However, the RF-86F continued to be involved in clandestine and standard reconnaissance missions after the Korean War ended. The Pacific Coast Air Museum received it's RF-86F on July 29, 1997.

"Planned Giving" to the Pacific Coast Air Museum

I don't know about you, but I always have good intentions about donating to worthwhile organizations. Often I follow through. But just as often I don't for a variety of reasons.

I recently learned that I can donate to the Pacific Coast Air Museum (PCAM) through a variety of ways, most of which don't involve tapping my scarce funds now.

Because PCAM is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, most gifts qualify for Federal and State income tax charitable contributions.

Some of the many ways we can donate to the Pacific Coast Air Museum are:

Outright Gifts - gifts of cash, securities or other property

<u>Gift Pledges</u> - a pledge is a formal statement of intention to make a gift to PCAM. It may be followed by an immediate gift, or it may simply confirm your intention to make a gift in the future. Many donors choose to complete their pledge by making regular payments over time. This method often allows donors to give more generously than they might have otherwise.

<u>Gifts with Retained Interest</u> - Your gift to PCAM can allow you to hold an interest in that gift for your lifetime or for a specified term of years. After that time, the funds or gift become available to the Museum. For example, you can set up a charitable trust which allows you to receive income from that trust for a specified period, or life. You can donate your home to PCAM while retaining the right to live in it for life.

<u>Unrestricted Gifts</u> - Unrestricted gifts can be used as determined by the Board of Directors to meet changing or urgent Museum needs. When you do not restrict the gift, the Museum gains flexibility not otherwise available.

<u>Gifts of Endowment</u> - A gift of endowment demonstrates your farsighted commitment to the Museum. An endowment is a fund that is maintained in perpetuity and only a portion of the annual investment return is used for the purposes specified by the donor. The rest of the investment yield is returned to principal. Thus, over the years, the fund can grow and hopefully keep pace with inflation.

<u>Appreciated Securities</u> - A gift of long-term appreciated marketable securities helps you save taxes twice. Such a gift will provide an income tax charitable deduction and capital gains tax savings.

<u>Closely Held Securities</u> - Securities in a company that is not publicly traded are known as closely held securities. When a donor makes a gift of these securities to PCAM, the donor may enjoy tax savings and can even increase his or her income from the donated stock.

<u>Matching Gifts</u> - Many corporations can demonstrate their support for PCAM by matching, or multiplying, their employee's gifts to PCAM, up to a set amount. Before you make a gift to PCAM, you may want to ask whether your employer participates in such a program.

<u>Gifts of Real Estate</u> - When you give a gift of your home or real property to PCAM, you may claim an income tax charitable deduction based on the full market value of the gift, avoid capital gains taxes and eliminate certain costs associated with the transfer of real property. Gifts of real estate can also provide income to you.

As with all financial considerations, we encourage you to discuss potential tax advantages and other aspects of charitable giving with your attorney, tax advisor or financial consultant.

Members of the Pacific Coast Air Museum are extremely fortunate to have Deirdre Cruse, an outstanding Elder Law attorney and PCAM member, who has volunteered her services to PCAM members interested in any of the Planned Giving programs outlined above. Deirdre has offered to discuss these areas with you, and will provide help in setting up your will or trust should you desire to include PCAM. We are fortunate to have Diedre Kruse, elder law attorney and museum member, who will provide will, trust and IRA donation services at no cost to museum members who wish to give IRA funds, or donate funds or assets in their wills or estates, to the Pacific Coast Air Museum. 












Can you identify this aircraft?
