#### JANUARY MEMBERS OF THE MONTH




## The Harrier is Here, The Harrier is Here (at least the fuselage is) AV-8C "Harrier"

The Harrier evolved from the famous British Harrier Jump Jet, so called because it can take off directly upward from a runway or a carrier deck, using lift from a system that rotates the engine exhaust downward for vertical or short take off and landing (V/STOL). It was designed and built by Hawker Siddeley (now British Aerospace), with the first flight in 1961. In 1972 under a license agreement, McDonnell Douglas began development of an improved edition for the U.S. Marine Corps.

Using the U.S. Navy (therefore Marine) aircraft designation AV-8A, the first flight was in 1978, obtaining operational capability in 1982, roughly the same time as the Falklands War between Britain and Argentina.

The name "Harrier" is derived from the fairly large raptor of the same name which has the ability to hover. The Naval designation AV stands for "Attack" and "Vertical Take Off", and this is the eighth model of that particular type of aircraft. The last letter denotes which "edition" it is of that type. Our newly acquired aircraft is the third version noted as "C".

The power plant is the Pratt & Whitney F402 turbojet Originally a Rolls Royce Pegasus 103.

## "All Ahead Full Into Deepwater"

## A sneak peek at the future of The United States Coast Guard

#### Presented By: Lieutenant Commander Wayne Seamans, USCG

As an agency under the Department of Homeland Security, the Coast Guard has added to its traditional duties the task of protecting the sea ports and coastline of America from terrorist activity. To accomplish this extension of the traditional national defense role, and continue to provide the best service in its other mission areas, the Coast Guard has embarked in a 25 year effort to incorporate the latest technology that will allow it to operate more safely, more efficiently, and most important more effectively. This presentation will provide a peek into the ships, aircraft and systems that will enable the Coast Guard to sail successfully through the 21st century.

#### Lieutenant Commander Wayne Seamans

Wayne graduated from Coast Guard recruit training at Training Center Alameda, California in 1980 and was assigned to the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter RESOLUTE home ported in Astoria, Oregon. His tour in RESO-LUTE included fisheries law enforcement, drug interdiction operations and search and rescue along the West Coast.

Wayne then attended Yeoman School at Training Center Petaluma and was assigned to the U.S.C.G. Cutter DALLAS home ported in New York City. His tour in DALLAS included drug enforcement operations in the Caribbean, fisheries enforcement off the Northeast coast and NATO operations in the Atlantic Ocean and the North Sea. Wayne then returned to Petaluma to teach at Yeoman School and was subsequently assigned to the icebreaker CGC POLAR STAR. In "The STAR", operations included Arctic environmental research and supporting the Antarctic Research Program.

Wayne once again returned to Petaluma where he was advanced to Chief Petty Officer (E-7) and managed the conversion of the base computer system to Coast Guard Standard Workstation II, the first computers the service acquired with color and graphics capability. In 1992, Wayne was appointed to Chief Warrant Officer and transferred to the 5th Coast Guard District in Portsmouth, Virginia where he managed the training support of over 5000 men and women at units from North Carolina to New Jersey.

After completing yet a 3rd tour at Petaluma, Wayne was assigned as Chief of Personnel at the Integrated Support Command on Coast Guard Island in Alameda. In 1999, he became a true "Mustang" when he was appointed to the rank of Lieutenant. While serving as the Island Command Security Officer, Wayne's job became much more complicated on September 11, 2001 after which he was tasked with providing the "Post—9/11" Protection of Coast Guard assets on and around an island situated between two densely populated Bay Area Cities.

Wayne is currently serving as the Commanding Officer of Military Personnel at Training Center Petaluma where he is responsible for administration, discipline and security.

#### Log Your Volunteer Hours

It is important for all of us to log our volunteer hours because they show the level of support the museum receives from it's own members. Why is that so? When it is time for the museum to apply for grants or request donations from donors of substantial means they in many cases want to know the level of support from the members and they measure that by hours volunteered. Some of these groups, especially foundations, have formulas (or rules of thumb) to convert to a dollar figure. That figure is \$25.00 per hour. Well folks, so far this year, 2005, there are 11,077 hours logged, for a total of \$276,925, the value of the hours you have donated. Now you can see the importance of hours logged and we know many of you have been remiss in not staying current. This is especially true for the Air Show. It is easy to log your hours. A hard copy logbook can be found in the museum or you can record your hours on line. For recording on line, go to the Pacific Coast Air Museum home page, scroll to the bottom, and click on "Volunteer Log" and log in. User name is **pcam2002**, and the password is **volunteer2002**. Just follow the directions. The **Volunteer Badge** is available to anyone who donates any of their time. **Volunteer Hour Pins** are awarded for 100, 300, 500, 1000 and increments of 1000 hours to 5000 hours.
