PCAM History – The First Thirty Years

Continued from March Straight Scoop.....

By 1992 PCAM had a home of sorts, at least a building in which we could hold our monthly meetings. We had elected a board of directors, written a set of by-laws, applied for our tax-exempt status and organized our first Open House. We were well along on becoming a museum, however we still didn't have any airplanes. And then things started to happen. We learned that Denny Lynch of Lynch Flying Service in Billings Montana was closing his operation and was selling off all of his aircraft. This included several flying Douglas A-26 tankers and lots of parts. He was having an auction and several of our members were in attendance. As expected, the flying aircraft sold for big money. There was however, a project A-26 lying in pieces out in a field that could be purchased for \$40K. At the next board meeting there was discussion about how we might possibly afford to purchase it. We had money in the bank from dues and profits from our Open House but not nearly enough to buy it. Enter once more our life saver in the form of Russ Etchell. To Russ it was simple. All we needed to do was find ten people who would loan the museum \$4K apiece. We were very confident of our ability to pay them all back but it would take some time. Russ started making the rounds and in no time had raised the money. Local trucks were dispatched and soon we had ourselves our first airplane. It would require lots of work but it was unique in many regards and a perfect fit for us. Score our first airplane (project).

About this same time we received a phone call from the Navy. It seemed that there was a Navy jet on 19th Ave. in San Francisco and the powers that be were wanting it to go away. The Navy told us it was ours for the taking. Being mostly long-term residents of Sonoma County we were very

familiar with the F8 Crusader sitting in a park. Even so we drove down to take a look at it. It had been rendered a children's play-thing years before. The cockpit had been filled with concrete. A large pipe had been placed inside the fuselage for kids to crawl through. It was sitting on its belly in a sand pit with graffiti written all over it. We were soon convinced that it was beyond even our talented restorer's abilities and told the Navy so days later when we returned their call. That could have been the end of it except that the Navy called us back a few weeks later hoping we might reconsider. We hadn't. By the time they called for a third time, we had. It seemed we were desperate for airplanes and well, how bad could it be. Weeks later we launched a recovery team including cranes and flat -beds to bring it home. Our first discovery was that it was not sitting on its belly. In fact, the landing gear were intact and had been buried in sand. We carefully removed the upper wing, loaded the aircraft and safely transported it to Sonoma County Airport. The Crusader restoration was long and arduous however, member Carl Thompson was up to the task. And here the Crusader chapter shall end for now save one very important foot note. A short time later our phone rang again and once more it was the Navy and they had something we might want. It seemed that they were eternally grateful for solving the San Francisco Crusader problem and they had some more aircraft looking for a home. Like an A6 Intruder, an F-14 Tomcat and an F-16 Viper. AND, they were willing to deliver. But that's yet another story.

Presidents Message

The first quarter of 2019 has just slipped by and I thought it would be interesting to take a look at what changes have occurred, our progress to date and what the next quarter might look like. The new year started with the museum occupying our new site. After the 2018 Wings over Wine Country, all of our planes were moved to the new Butler hangar area and placed on concrete...a great improvement.

However, after the planes were moved, the old location, on the corner of Laughlin Road and Becker was left vacant and people driving by on Laughlin Road got the impression that the museum no longer existed. This resulted in a significant drop in visitors to the gift shop and the museum. It became apparent that something had to be done to reverse that situation, and quickly. As I pointed out in last month's Straight Scoop, Director Hunt formed the PAC-10 committee to address the situation. It was decided to move the gift shop to the former Dragonfly building, which we own. Work began immediately to clean out the contents that were abandoned when the building was vacated by the Dragonfly Flying School. In December, brush was cleared out around the parking lot and several trees removed. Brush was also cleared out along the fence between the museum and the Cornerstone property. The result was a tremendous improvement in visibility from Laughlin Road. Our project director, Chris Brown, assembled a team of volunteers and went to work on taking care of deferred maintenance. A new roof, gutters and downspouts have been installed.

Recently, President Ford, Vice President Werback and Chris Brown have had meetings with Michael

Coxx of the Hedgpeth Architectural firm. Currently, we are in a "holding pattern" while we are waiting to get a USE PERMIT and CONSTRUCTON PERMIT. In the meantime, some deferred maintenance items can be taken care of such as replacing the front and rear exterior doors, remove the old deck, replace damaged siding, clean and paint the exterior. Once the permits are issued, which might be six to eight weeks from now, work can begin to complete the "new" gift shop and once it is completed, we will move into our new gift shop. Presently, we are most likely looking at moving in around July or August. With luck...maybe sooner.

Kudos to Chris Brown and the volunteers who have stepped up to tackle this project. Much has been done, but more work is to be done and the final push to complete the project will start as soon as the permits are issued. If you are a "DIY'er" and can swing a hammer and drive a nail....come join the fun.

PCAM joins in for Wiseman-Cooke Challenge at Sonoma-Marin Fairground

Last Fall, Sonoma Marin County Fair CEO, Allison Keaney was creating a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) event and asked if PCAM would be interested in helping out. Allison wanted to commemorate history's first Air Mail flight that occurred on February 11, 1911. The Wiseman-Cooke flight originated in Petaluma and concluded in Santa Rosa. Flying a Curtis bi-plane, Fred Wiseman delivered three letters, a sack of coffee and 50 *Press Democrat* newspapers. The actual transport took three days!

After brainstorming with PCAM, Allison came up with the plan to challenge grade school students from Petaluma to build paper airplanes, add cargo (mini copies of the Press Democrat, letters along with "bags" of groceries) and simulate a reenactment of the original route of flight using the concepts of STEM. PCAM members Dan Widger, LeeAnn Sacchi and Charley Taylor offered design suggestions and assistance as fifty Third through Fifth graders folded recycled paper into flying machines. The most promising design was the Widger "Delta Dart" model. The Taylor design was right off the NASA STEM website and was the listed world's record design for the longest time of flight by a paper airplane (almost 22 seconds- indoors). Problem, our flights were flown outdoors. LeeAnn lik-

Marin County 4-H All Star Ambassadors members Taylor Boothe, Katie Shepardson and Olivia Blantz mentored as the students fastened cargo to their winged paper creations. The young pilots then headed outside for the course that included signs depicting the origin and destination towns and the current communities along the way. (Penngrove, Cotati and Rohnert Park). Thomas Keaney, using a large Post It board, recorded data such as the pilot's name, aircraft design type and number of legs required for each plane to complete the trip. Like many early aviators and designers, our students relied on testing results and many went back to the drawing board to build better airplanes. We were very encouraged to see the number of young ladies who continued to perfect their designs.


The percentage is low but if many of us do this it will add up as end of year income. 💲

" Memoirs of a Navy Major: Carrier Hornet Sunk, then Found"

As a 19-year-old seaman who had been in the Navy for about a year and a half, Richard Nowatzki's ship USS Hornet (CV 8) was mortally wounded in the intense World War II Battle of Santa Cruz Islands. In this first-hand account, from his book Memoirs of a Navy Major, Nowatzki shares his experiences in the extraordinarily brutal and dangerous environment of combat at sea.

Hornet had survived the first wave of a massive coordinated assault. But the ship and her crew were still in peril. Hornet then suffered a devastating second attack leaving her dead in the water with an evacuation of the massive ship underway in the face of the approaching enemy who eventually sunk the carrier.

This is an often graphic account of a junior Sailor experiencing the horror of war and contemplating his own mortality at an early age.

Wait, there's more... FLASH: the sunken Hornet was been found in Feb. 2019! A CBS news clip of the discovery will be shown. *

Richard's bio:

Richard Nowatzki was born in Freeport, Illinois, in 1923 but soon moved to Chicago. He graduated high school in June 1941 and enlisted in the U.S. Navy. As a young seaman fresh out of boot camp, Nowatzki became a plankowner of the aircraft carrier USS Hornet (CV 8). He served aboard the ship through commissioning, the famed Doolittle Raid, the Battle of Midway and was aboard when Hornet was sunk by the

enemy in October 1942.
Richard Nowatzki went on to a very successful U.S.
Navy career eventually retiring in 1973 as a
Lieutenant Commander.

Open Cockpit *Top Gun Weekend* F-14 Tomcat, F-16 Viper, F-5 Tiger



This month we present three planes that featured big in training US Navy pilots: the F-14A Tomcat, F-16N Viper, and F-5E Tiger II. During various training scenarios and programs, the F-16 and F-5 were flown as enemy "aggressor" airplanes because their performance closely matched that of the enemy planes our Navy pilots were likely to encounter. Pilots in F-14s would square off against experienced pilots in the aggressor planes, until the good guys in the F-14s learned how to beat them.

The F-14, F-16, and F-5 are on loan from the National Naval Aviation Museum at Pensacola, Florida.
